In the 1920s when Epworth was in need of more beds and equipment to meet demand from the sick in Melbourne, our generous hospital community donated everything from money to flowers, chickens and even a parcel of fish to help fund the expansion. In the '60s, Epworth saw the need for a neurological and neurosurgery unit. Who did we turn to to make bring this goal to fruition? Our donors, who once again gave generously and in great numbers to make this possible.

And late last year, when we reached out to the Epworth family for help purchasing two "sentinel node navigator probes" to diagnose and treat breast cancer, you responded with your customary generosity and enthusiasm: 1,102 people donated their own money to help us buy the probes, many writing personal notes of encouragement for our team that they sent in with their cheques. By January we were able to purchase and install this new technology, and surgeons at both Richmond and Freemasons can now provide patients with the best diagnosis equipment available.

As I was curating records of generosity and innovation to share in our book Built on Giving* last year, stories like these came up time and again. Epworth identified a need, or an opportunity to provide even better care to our patients, and the Epworth family stepped up and gave generously so that need could be met and the opportunity grasped.

It's a pattern of kindness and generosity that is woven into the fabric of our community, and one that gives me enormous hope for the future of our hospital.

There are many more such stories to celebrate in this newsletter, and I hope you enjoy them as much as I have. Patients with eye cancer can now receive life-changing treatment at Epworth thanks to our generous donor community.

The new Cryotherapy Console enables Epworth ophthalmologists to increase the level of care for patients with eve cancer.

The Cryotherapy Console uses a specialised freezing technique to treat eye cancers and eye lesions by using a freezing probe to the eye and its surrounds.

"Cryotherapy is mainly used for treatment of surface cancers of the eye – the conjunctiva – which is the covering of the white of the eye," says Dr Andrew Narita, Epworth Ophthalmologist.

"Eye cancers on the surface of the eye are often caused by sun or UV damage."

"We remove the cancerous area with surgery and use the freezing technique to decrease the rates of recurrence."

In addition to cancers on the surface of the eye, cryotherapy treatment can be used to treat retinal tears and evelid lesions.

For one of Dr Narita's patients, the cryotherapy treatment changed his life.

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I recently treated a patient who works outside every day. He had a focal (localised) cancer on the surface of his eye and we were able to freeze it off

He's gone back to work without any issues.

If we couldn't provide this treatment, there was risk of losing his eye sight which would have had life-changing implications.

The generosity of donors enabled Epworth to purchase a new cryotherapy unit, which has allowed us to provide a great level of care.

State-of-the-art equipment including the Endoscopic Ultrasound, SPY-PHI and Observation Machines were funded via recent appeals.


"It's a privilege to see first-hand the new equipment funded by donors to the Epworth Medical Foundation," says Mr George Stamas. "

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New microscope providing magnified vision for surgeons

Epworth donors have enabled the purchase of a new Zeiss microscope, ensuring Epworth is one of the first hospitals in Australia to have this state-of-the-art microscope in theatre to treat patients.

This highly advanced microscope will provide Epworth surgeons with greater magnified vision to perform Ear, Nose and Throat, Urology and Plastics surgery.

For Dr Amanda Richards, Ear Nose and Throat Otolaryngologist, the Zeiss microscope is particularly important when treating a patient's voice box.

"The voice box itself is a tiny organ," says Dr Richards.

"Often, the growth I need to remove from a patient's voice box is only one or two millimetres in size, and despite this, it can cause the patient significant problems".

Dr Richards reflects that one of the key things about this microscope is that it has brilliant optics and is easy to move around, helping her to complete a surgery as smoothly as possible.

I am able to get a super high-definition picture. I can move the microscope around with great ease, zooming the picture in and out to give myself the perfect anale to see the voice box.

I can magnify the vocal folds to a point where I am able to make tiny movements that in fact look huge on the screen. In reality, they are the smallest of movements

There's no doubt that this is the most finessed microscope I have access to – I absolutely love it.

2,000 cardiac patients treated in new La Trobe Financial Cardiac Catheterisation Unit

Epworth cardiologists have treated 2,000 patients since the opening of the new, world-class La Trobe Financial Cardiac Catheterisation Unit in October 2020.

"The equipment in the new unit is an absolute dream," says Epworth Cardiologist A/Prof Ron Dick.

Amongst the 2,000 cases, Epworth cardiologists have performed:

- 1,200 coronary angiography cases including stenting and TAVI
- 388 arrythmia surgeries including pacemakers and cardiac ablations to treat heart arrythmias
- 380 vascular procedures including the placement of stents to create better blood supply to a patient's legs and other organs.

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We have also provided critically urgent care to patients with evolving heart attacks who have come into Epworth via the Emergency Department,

Providing immediate care to unblock a patient's coronary artery and decrease the size of the heart attack is ultimately life-saving, reducing the impact on the heart and supporting a quicker recovery.

We can provide this level of care because we have first-class equipment.



With thanks to the generosity of the Jreissati Family, The Jreissati Family Pancreatic Research Centre at Epworth has launched, seeking to revolutionise the treatment and care of patients with pancreatic cancer.

The Jreissati family understands the fear and uncertainty that follows a pancreatic cancer diagnosis. Knowing the impact it's had on their family, the Jreissati's wanted to change the patient and family experience for others.

"Pancreatic cancer, once it grabs you, it has a mission. And the mission is to grow the fastest way possible undetected," says Elias Jreissati.

"We need to be able to detect it earlier and we need to be able to deal with it very quickly once detected."

Led by Centre Director A/Prof Andrew Metz, the Jreissati Family Pancreatic Centre is the first of its kind in Victoria. "The outcomes for patients diagnosed with pancreatic cancer have barely improved in 40 years."

"Pancreatic cancer is going to be the second biggest cancer killer in Australia within 10 years. We are committed to changing that".

The centre is dedicated to the research and treatment of pancreatic cancer, but it is much more than a centre of excellence in treating a disease. It is a centre committed to finding answers that will allow patients the opportunity for better outcomes. "One of the centre's primary missions is to find a way to diagnose patients in the early stages of pancreatic cancer," shares A/Prof Metz'

"Early diagnosis will increase the number of patients with operable tumours. This will help achieve the centre's ultimate goal - to increase the survival rate for patients diagnosed with this disease."

A pancreatic cancer diagnosis can be overwhelming for a patient and their family, and in an Australian first, Epworth has appointed Jo-Anne Crowther, a dedicated Pancreatic Nurse Coordinator to coordinate a patient's care in collaboration with a patient's treatment team.

I see myself as the go-to person for the patient. I will meet them at their initial consultation, gauge their needs and enable them to really understand what they're going through and what their treatment plan is.

It is important that the patient and their loved ones are aware what is happening and what may be ahead for them. It is equally important that they feel supported emotionally. I am in the unique position where I have the opportunity to spend time getting to know the patient and providing that support.

I'm available to answer any questions, whether that be about their medications or treatment, or understanding where to park at the hospital. Anything that will help ease their minds and take away some of the worry.

Epworth Centre for Immunotherapies and Snowdome Laboratories

The Epworth Centre for Immunotherapies and Snowdome Laboratories is now open, and it is 100% funded by philanthropy.


How one act of kindness makes a lifetime of difference

James Patrick 'Pat' Polland was a caring, generous man, known in his community as someone who was always willing to help others.

Born in the small rural community of Moyston near Ararat in 1926, he did very well at the local school despite a severe, long-lasting illness at the age of 10. While recovering he took up photography. He won many photography competitions and his photos were published in the Weekly Times.

As a grazier Pat ran a farm raising sheep, cattle and grain. He was an active member of the CFA, receiving multiple awards in recognition of his years of service.

Pat was a very generous man, whether that be lending machinery to his neighbours, or fitting out a fire-fighting unit at his own expensive. He wanted to ensure that the people he cared about were taken care of.

There is perhaps no greater reflection of Pat's genuine care for others and desire to make a difference in the community than his decision to leave the majority of his estate to Epworth via his Will. New equipment funded by Pat Polland's bequest helps a patient walk again

Nicolas Topia is learning to walk again after being seriously injured in a hit-run collision on New Year's Day.

Having spent the morning cooking breakfast for his family, he decided to go for a ride on his motorcycle.

After more than a dozen operations, a decision was made to amputate his lower leq.

The grandfather of nine has undergone rehabilitation at Epworth Hawthorn, working with a physiotherapist, occupational therapist and rehabilitation doctor, to improve his movement before he is fitted with a prosthetic leg. His rehabilitation includes a gym session in the morning and working with a physiotherapist in the afternoon.

Thanks to the Polland Family Endowment Fund, Epworth purchased rehabilitation equipment to help enhance a patient's recovery. This includes:

- Pilates reformer
- · Dumbbell weights
- Upper body ergometer
- Treadmill
- Ergonomic bike
- Step up boxes

Mr Topia said gym sessions have been with several other amputees, who understand what he is going through.

"There's a few amputees in here so we all talk," Mr Topia said.

"It's pretty good as you can help one another. I am just new to this, so it's good to talk to someone else who has been through it." Despite his injury, Mr Topia remains positive about his future, looking forward to being able to spend time again with his three daughters and nine grandchildren.

"I just want to move forward and be a happy person, like I am. I am always a happy person." Nicolas Topia is just one of thousands of patients who have benefited from the generosity and kindness shown by Pat Polland via the Polland Family Endowment Fund. Used for pancreatic, liver, bladder and prostate cancer tumour removals, this real-time intraoperative ultrasound system allows the surgeon to make critical decisions.



6 x Headsets for complex cardiac cases

New headsets will support our cardiologists to communicate directly with the technical specialists in the control centre, assisting them in their treatment of the patient.
